Pink Triangle Day

Friday, February 14, 2014. 35th anniversary of Pink Triangle Day, Nova Scotia's gift to LGBT Canada. On July 1, 1979, the seventh annual conference of the Canadian Lesbian and Gay Rights Coalition adopted a resolution put forth by Robin Metcalfe on behalf of the Gay Alliance for Equality, proclaiming February 14 as an annual gay holiday, to be known as Pink Triangle Day.

The Pink Triangle became an LGBT symbol in honour of gay men who were forced to wear them in Nazi concentration camps. Lesbians and other "antisocial" women wore black triangles.

Launch of the second edition of Robin Metcalfe's catalogue Queer looking, queer acting will take place February 14 in Halifax at a location not yet set. The launch was previously announced for the Turret building, but it is now closed due to asbestos issues.
