Amnesty International :

What woud it be like to spend the holidays sentenced to prison, perhaps for sending an e-mail critical of the government, or organizing a protest against antigay legislation? Amnesty International knows prisoners around the world who have been sentenced for non-violent resistence to repression.

"Write a letter, change a life." You need not be a member to join Amnesty's "write for rights" celebration of Human Rights Day, Just Us Cafe, 5896 Spring Garden Road, Halifax, Saturday December 10, 11:00 am to 2:00 pm.

You can write letters in the comfort of your own home : food in the cupboard, heat in the radiator, police with torture equipment unlikely to break down your door... Does it work? Hundreds of letters from former prisoners say that letters from members of Amnesty International were a warning to authorities that the eyes of the world were upon them. Some prisoners were released, others were allowed contact with families or doctors.

Change in The Gambia :

Gambia's president Yahya Jammeh who had ruled for 22 years, was riding high last spring when he said he would personally slit the throats of any gays found in his small nation. He had previously referred to LGBT people as "vermin," and threatened to behead them.

An early December election promises some changes in The Gambia : a sevenparty coalition led by Adama Barrow defeated Jammeh, who stepped down peacefully. The coalition's stance on LGBT issues is not known, but its campaign promised greater respect for human rights.

6. Rev. George Parker 1929 - 2016:

Rev. George William Parker age 87 years of Bedford passed away peacefully on December 11, 2016 at the Abby Lane Hospital in Halifax.

George hosted many summer "Over 30s Parties" at his home in Greenhill, Hants County. One of the highlights of the occasion was a walk back in the woods to a lovely waterfalls... and occasionally partake in a skinny dip!

Funeral service will be held 1:00pm on Monday December 19, 2016 at Saint Francis by the Lakes Anglican Church, 192 First Lake Drive in Lower Sackville. A reception will follow service in the church hall. Complete obituary will be posted soon.
