

Composite Drawings Bring 'Barrage Of Telephone Calls'

Aside from "a barrage of phone calls" resulting from the composite drawings of two youths released Tuesday morning, Halifax RCMP said last night there were no new developments in the investigation of the stabbing death of a Lower Sackville merchant.

CONCENTRATED

Police said they were carrying out a "concentrated

investigation" into the death of Robert Arthur Ward, 51, whose body was found in a Lakeside ditch Saturday morning. Mr. Ward had been stabbed 21 times with an instrument "larger than a pocket knife."

Two youths are being

sought for questioning. They were believed to have been hitch-hikers.

A spokesman declined to state where the force was centering its investigation.

"We're concentrating the investigation where it's leading us," he said.

Officials Confident Goal To Be Reached

The Halifax - Dartmouth United Appeal, whose 1967 campaign ended Monday, is now in the "cleanup" stage of the operation and officials have announced they expect to meet their objective of \$613,000.

Campaign chairman Ronald Smith said he was confident the goal would be reached.

Mr. Smith said: "It is most important to our metro area that this objective of \$613,000 be reached. If not, services being provided by our 32 health and welfare organizations will be drastically curtailed."

At the campaign's official end, \$577,232 (94 per cent of the quota) was in. Campaign officials have allotted the last two weeks in November to cleaning up pledges still outstanding, including those from provincial, city and company employees.

The federal services division exceeded its quota for the first time in five years. Others over their quotas included Halifax and Dartmouth schools, Dartmouth doctors, Dartmouth city employees and Halifax architects.

National Sea Net Profit Down

National Sea Products Limited, in its annual report for the year ended Aug. 31, 1967, shows a net profit of \$112,771, after provision for income taxes for certain subsidiary companies and recovered income taxes, compared to \$1,183,152 for 1966.

In the report to shareholders released Tuesday, company president R. G. Smith termed the 1966-67 fiscal year "disappointing."

However, a new company record was established in consolidated net sales and other revenue, amounting to \$54,703,002—an increase of \$828,065 over the previous year.
