4:30 pm.




This year we have booked the Gazebo!



**QUAKE : Queers and Allies for the Khyber Enduring** The Khyber Building, once home to the venerable Turret Club, is in danger of being sold to developers who may demolish it.

A July 26 story in The Coast, Reality Bites, reports that city staff have recommended the building be sold due to poor conditions and hazardous materials. They estimate that it would cost \$4.15 million to repair it, and would require yearly maintenance of \$33,000.00. District councillor Wayne Mason, who has been working on ways of saving the building, was taken by surprise. He says an Administrative Order requires councillors to be informed of such decisions in advance so they can discuss public interest with the residents. However, in this case the procedure had not been followed. "I feel like it's a real lack of imagination for us to go right to a sale," The Coast quotes Mason as saying.

A "Save the Khyber" group has been established on Facebook under the name QUAKE - Queers and Allies for the Khyber Enduring, but so far no actions or events have been posted.

**\* Elderberries get-together after Pride Parade to talk about our history**

NSRAP Chair Kate Shewan writes about the planned get-together : "It turned out that the volume of the music from the main stage made it almost impossible to have a sit down and chat at our booth. I ... think Pride were trying to give us a prime spot, but this also meant it was close to the stage, and even at other booth locations the noise would have been challenging. We did get a number of people stopping by and talking, but the coffee house idea didn't work so well due to the noise.

"That being said, I think everyone agreed that it was a concept that should be resurrected and promoted at a different time and place. I have talked to a few younger community members who have said they would love to chat with people about the history of activism in Halifax. So we need to talk more on this."
