


4 — Emancipation Day August 1st

On March 24, 2021 the Canadian House of Commons voted to declare August first Emancipation Day annually, in memory of Great Britain's 1834 Slavery Abolition Act. That act applied to her colonies in Canada as well as parts of her then-vast empire.

At first only children under six were freed. Everyone else was gradually freed within four to six years.


From 1650 to 1834 records show 4200 people were enslaved. Most of them were indigenous in Ontario and Quebec; some were mentioned in the records of Louisbourg. (Excerpted from an email by Lynn Murphy.) For more information about Emancipation Day, visit

5 Isolation Time History Work!


